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Our Mission

The mission of the Bonner County Sheriff's Office Community Watch Program is to proactively partner with law abiding citizens to prevent and reduce crime. This will be accomplished through communication, crime prevention education and assisting communities, neighborhoods and businesses in achieving a safe environment for its residents.

We currently have 37 Community Watch Groups consisting of 55 Captains & Co-Captains and 724 members.

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Star Card - Idaho's REAL ID

The Star Card is the Idaho driver's license or identification card (ID) that **adds a Star** for compliance with the REAL ID security standards. Passed by Congress in 2005, the REAL ID Act requires uniform standards for credentials, such as driver's licenses and ID cards.

You are required to have a Star Card when boarding a commercial flight, if that is your only ID. Without a Star Card or other form of accepted, government issued identification that complies with the *REAL ID Act*, such as a U.S. Passport or military ID, you will be turned away. Avoid the disappointment, hassle, or disruption in your travel plans – get a Star Card *today*.

A Star Card, passport, or military ID is also required to access any federal facility such as a national laboratory or military base.

A U.S. passport will still be required to fly internationally.

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Revision to Idaho's Trespass Law

House Bill 658 goes into effect July 1. The following information was taken from the spring edition of the Idaho Farm Bureau Quarterly.

"This past legislative session, Idaho lawmakers overwhelmingly passed a bill that clarifies, simplifies and strengthens the state's trespassing laws. Its design is to balance the rights of landowners and the rights of the public and is a solid improvement upon the state's previous trespassing laws. Under Idaho's previous trespassing codes, someone guilty of criminal trespassing faced a \$50 fine, if convicted. That was hardly enough to deter trespassers or give prosecutors reason to pursue a conviction. Under the new statute, someone guilty of criminal trespass faces a minimum \$300 fine for a first conviction, \$1,500 for a second conviction and \$5,000 for a third conviction. Someone with a third conviction could face a felony charge if there is more than \$1,000 worth of damage involved with the trespass. Not only is this felony provision harmonious with current law when it comes to malicious damage to property, it is completely reasonable."

With proper planning, information will be forthcoming in future newsletters. In the meantime the following website offers some help:




Security Landscaping

Law Enforcement calls it "crime prevention through environmental design" but the principles are simple: Increase visibility throughout your yard (front and back), limit access to your property and eliminate hiding spots. You want to keep your bushes (including hedges) trimmed to 2 or 3 feet tall. Taller bushes provide burglars good hiding spots. In addition, it is recommended the first 7 feet of tree branches be pruned to prevent someone from climbing into an attic or second floor of a residence or other building.

To further deter break-ins, you can plant thorny bushes under windows. Some plants that work well are common holly, barberries, firethorn, creeping juniper, purple berberis, blackthorn and roses. Also, using gravel stones under windows to eliminate a criminal's ability to be silent. Anyone who walks on that gravel will make a loud crunching noise with each step.

No one should feel unsafe in their homes or experience the violation of having a stranger enter your house and take something that belongs to you. Make it harder for the criminals.





The only visual difference between the current Idaho driver's license design and the Star Card is the Star on the upper right hand side of the card. Only a Star Card allows you to board a commercial flight or access a federal facilities such as a military base or national laboratory without an alternative form of accepted, government issued identification that complies with the REAL ID Act. A current Idaho driver's license (non-Star Card) will allow you to legally drive and provide your identity for tasks like buying alcohol, obtaining social services, or registering to vote.
